

11. Sporting Pistol or Revolver Precision Shooting

Target: 1 x Gallery Rifle Target (Size A3)

The objective of the shooting competition is to improve members' shooting skills. Members may only enter one score per day. Participation in the postal league will qualify as a dedicated activity.



Handgun or revolver: calibers from .22 rimfire.

Course of Fire

This event is shot at 15 meters in 4 practices. It takes approximately 8 minutes to complete

It requires 20 rounds. The maximum possible score is 200.

Position: Standing unsupported

Ready Position: Revolver holstered, hammer down. Pistol holstered, slide forward, safety catch applied.

Sights: Any colour iron (spotting scopes may be used)

Sighters: 5 shots in 120 seconds

Practice 1

1 x series of 5 shots in 20 seconds

Practice 2

2 x series of 2 shots in 10 seconds – tap tap, tap tap.....tap tap, tap tap

Practice 3

3 x series of 2 shots in 15 seconds – tap tap, tap tap, tap tap

Practice 4

1 x series of 5 shots rapid fire in 10 seconds

Classifications

The classification score bands are as follows:

X Class 195 - 200

A Class 189 - 194

B Class 184 - 188

C Class up – 183

Firearms must be unloaded when moving between positions. All rounds and cases must be ejected before moving. Pistols must have the action locked open and the magazine removed.

Reloading

After the initial load, all further loading must be with rounds taken from the competitor's pocket, cartridge belt, mechanical loader, special pouch or elsewhere on the competitor's person. It is the competitor's responsibility to have sufficient ammunition in their possession to complete the match or event. A dropped round, magazine, moon clip or speed loader may not be retrieved.

The course of fire must be completed on an official shooting range, signed off by a Range Officer or any responsible person employed to manage the range or fellow NRAPA shooter. The completed activities scorecard must be e-mailed, faxed or delivered by hand to the NRAPA' Head Office. The scorecard can be downloaded from our website. It is the shooter's responsibility to keep record of all targets.

Scoring

Target is scored at the end of the shoot only. Targets are to be scored in the usual manner: i.e. a hit that touches a scoring ring shall be given the higher value if a gauge of the same caliber as that used to fire on the target, touches some part of the ring when the gauge is inserted in the bullet hole, or an overlay scoring slide of the same caliber as that used to fire on the target touches some part of the scoring ring when the slide is laid on the target. A round that is found to have "tumbled" will be scored in the usual manner (best edge) if any part of the shot touches the scoring ring then it will be given that value. A tumbled round cannot be gauged.
